

neat tricks

So you want to get organized. Where to begin? Ask yourself which disorganized area causes you the most stress, says Ann T. Sullivan, founder of ATS Organizing Services (atsorganizing.com). Then you'll know what to take on first, whether it's an unruly closet or your kitchen cabinets. Sullivan offers these tips for getting started:

TAKE INVENTORY. You don't need two coffeemakers or two blenders—in fact, you

don't need more than one of any household appliance. Anything you got as a wed-

ding gift should replace your old one.

BE RUTHLESS. If you haven't worn something in two years, toss it. Ask yourself, "How likely am I to wear this again?" If it has special meaning (the dress you wore when you got your first job, your lucky shoes), take a picture, then give the item away.

GET CREATIVE. If you're a collector, you can do more than just stash your stuff. Try displaying your beloved album covers, old concert ticket stubs or playbills by framing them, making a collage or laminating them and using them as place mats.

BE KIND TO YOUR PHOTOS. When you get photos developed, get rid of the bad

pictures, separate the negatives from the photos and put your pictures in an album.

NAIL YOUR MAIL. Don't even allow junk mail in your home. Sort your mail over the outdoor trash can, then bring the rest inside.
